Set amid the buildings of the University of Cambridge, Tyndale House is a Christian community dedicated to researching all the primary evidence relevant to the study of the Bible. It possesses one of the finest libraries for biblical research in the world, packed with specialist material on the language, culture, history, and meaning of the Bible. It also has facilities for medium and long-term accommodation. The House enjoys close links with the University of Cambridge and many postgraduates, church leaders, and visiting scholars have found it an ideal setting for their own study.

The scholars and publications that have come from Tyndale House since its founding in 1944 have had a worldwide impact, and all major modern Protestant Bible translations have benefited significantly from the input of scholars associated with the House. Tyndale House is committed to making biblical scholarship available and accessible to the church.

Tyndale House also offers:

- A local team and global network of scholars who are committed to serving the church
- Conferences both for scholars and lay people
- A centre for the study and promotion of Christian Ethics
- Regular scholarly publications, including our journal the Tyndale Bulletin
- Free electronic resources for serious Bible study.

TOOLS WITH A MISSION

In many countries of the world people have few skills, little education and no means of earning a living. A switch from aid dependency to self-sufficiency is impossible without help. Tools With A Mission (TWAM) exists to provide that help.

TWAM has volunteer collectors all over the United Kingdom who collect unwanted tools from donors. These are tools that are in reasonable condition but are no longer wanted by their owners. The tools are refurbished and sorted into complete kits before being sent in response to specific requests from associates in many countries. TWAM sends about 20 containers each year to its partners in the third world.

Adoption Matters North West

Adoption Matters North West is a voluntary Christian Adoption Agency and a registered charity which is based in Chester and has its roots in the former Chester Diocesan Adoption Agency being established in 1955. It is a specialist Adoption Agency which covers the whole of the northwest and is one of the top three Adoption Agencies in the United Kingdom, having been awarded the Adoption Services of the year award in 2012 by the British Adoption and Fostering organisation of the U.K.

The Agency's aim is to find families for children who for one reason or another are no longer able to live with their birth families. The children come from many differing troubled backgrounds and may well have experienced a number of placements within the care system before being placed for adoption. Adoption matters specialise in finding families for older children, sibling groups and for children who have medical and developmental needs or a disability. The Agency has successfully placed 65 children in 2011 and since April 2012 has placed 36 children; only 4.5% of their placements breakdown compared with a national average of 20%, their success rate is attributed to their acknowledgement that adoption is a lifelong commitment and their provision of services into adulthood for adopted people, adopters and birth parents.

Advocate:

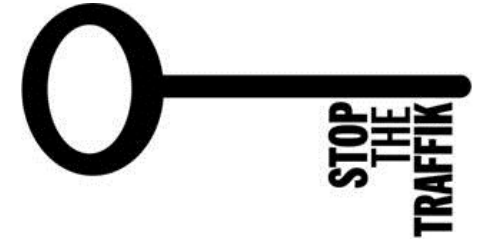
Engage with those who have the power to minimise the trafficking of People.

Chester Aid to the Homeless (CATH)

was founded in 1972 to provide help and support to the area's homeless people. **CATH's** work covers a long and complex journey of helping homeless people to rebuild their lives, with the ultimate aim of enabling them to once again move back into mainstream housing.

There are 54 beds available in a range of accommodation and an additional 500 people annually come to **CATH** for support in areas associated with being homeless. It's a demanding process but one that is supported by a skilful and dedicated staff, with additional support from committed volunteers, that sees all social, mental and physical health and education needs are assessed and tackled.

Cuppa

Cuppa is something which is set-up and overseen by the local churches (for mainly insurance purposes)

in Chester but the University of Chester Christian Union students run. It takes place (nearly) every Monday & Wednesday (recently, changed from Thursday) in term time. From 11:30pm till midnight a group of students meet and pray at Northgate Bistro, and then from midnight to around 3am a group of students go into town, armed with hot water, hot chocolate, tea and coffee to serve the people of Chester. They give out hot drinks for free to drunk students, sober students, homeless people, taxi drivers, bouncers and emergency services staff, basically anyone who wanders the streets at night! Over the years they have built up good relationships with a great number of people through this ministry which has created a lot of encouraging testimonies.

Life NoW

is a charity which aims to support the needs of young adults in the North West of England with life-limiting, life-threatening and end-of-life conditions.

Many more young people with terminal conditions who in the past would have died in childhood are now living into their adult years. This is wonderful news, but there is now a gap in the provision of services which they and their families need. The fact is that as they grow older their needs become more complex; however, they actually receive less support.

The aim of this charity is to build a Life NoW Centre to support these young adults, and their families, by providing appropriate and professional respite and palliative care.

Anne de Reybekill

Anne leads the Member Care Foundation in Pakistan, helping to make Member Care happen for the Pakistan team, for partners from many sending agencies and their national counterparts. Her work involves a mixture of training workshops, retreats, provision of resources and meeting people individually. In addition to Member Care she is also a consultant with Scripture Union, Pakistan. Anne is involved in the worship life of the local church, and is responsible for keeping in touch with the Punjab-based partners.

Rest Home (Retreat Centre)

Anne and her colleagues Dave and Georgina Newmarch have placed an offer on a house in Islamabad which they hope to purchase and turn into a Rest home / Retreat centre.

The Centre would give Christian workers in Pakistan an opportunity to spend a short break away from their workplaces and to recuperate from the pressures they face daily. The Centre would be established to resource the mission and aid communities, enabling them to continue to serve the peoples of Pakistan through their ongoing ministries. Primarily, this will be a place to unwind and find support, listening and healing. It will also be a place of resourcing through small Member Care related workshops and teaching seminars.

Bob and Pam Toan

Bob and Pam Toan provide Member Care for the Interseve Team in Cambodia. Currently there are 50 adults and about 40 children but the team is still growing - so they expect another 15 or so in 2013. Their job includes care of new arrivals, who usually stay in their house until they find their own accommodation. They meet up regularly with people in their

Chester Women's Aid

Chester Women's Aid is the Chester branch of a key national charity, providing safe and secure refuge to women and their children who have suffered or are at risk of suffering Domestic Violence and Sexual Abuse. The charity has 500 branches within the UK.

The Agency believes in the right of all women to live free from fear and abuse; they aim to raise the awareness of and the issues surrounding domestic violence; they advocate for those who are subjected to social exclusion and disadvantage and they empower women providing a channel for their voice to be heard. The Agency reflects the diversity of women's experiences in the world and promotes good practice amongst Agencies working with women who have and are suffering abuse.

Chester Women's Hostel

Chester Women's hostel is part of a national charity working with single homeless women aged 18years upwards and is based in Hoole. Applicants are referred via Agencies working within the social support network and priority is given to providing accommodation to applicants who have a Cheshire connection.

The hostel provides self-catering accommodation for 23 residents with an additional 6 spaces for those who are in the process of "moving on" for which there is a small charge. The residents are offered support during their stay at the hostel and are required to comply with basic "house rules" to ensure safety and commitment of the residents. The length of stay for residents varies, but on average is between 1 to 12 months.

The information is reliable, objective and given confidentially.

It does not just give a version of Christianity adhered to by one particular group of Christians ('denomination' or 'tradition'). Instead it attempts to explain and explore what Christians of all kinds believe.

CEA tries to respond to all enquirers by giving them what they ask for, and only what they ask for. It takes steps to ensure that no one is given information unsolicited. It does not seek to take the place of local churches.

It is an agency of Churches Together in Britain and Ireland and a registered charity (number 297393). CEA works on behalf of all the major UK churches, and in partnership with many Christian organisations.

The work of the Christian Enquiry Agency is entirely dependent on donations and grants.

The Church Pastoral Aid Society is an Anglican evangelical mission agency which started in 1836 and which works with churches, mainly in the UK and Republic of Ireland, to lead men, women and young people to Jesus. Some of the ways it does this:-

1. Developing and equipping leaders of local churches.
2. Running Venture holidays for children and young people.
3. Running Falcon camps for disadvantaged children and young people.
4. Patronage – seeking to fill vacant parishes with incumbents who are committed to seeing people won for Christ and built up in their faith.
5. Running the Arrow Leadership Programme for Christian leaders aged 25-40.



6. Vocation events – to help people explore God's call on their lives. These include You and Ministry weekends which have been running for 50 years.
